We supplied him with state-of-the-art equipment. Consequently, Dr. Mavila assisted in hundreds of outreach trips and performed hundreds of free surgeries over the next few years.

On my last visit to Lima, Dr. Mavila's clinic was running to capacity. He told me that half of his clients were charity cases that came searching for help. The other half of


his patients fully paid for services. I noticed an OCT machine in his office—cutting edge equipment used for very advanced diagnostics. Dr. Mavila purchased the OCT independent of CharityVision; he is now providing a whole new level of care to his fragile community. Our partnership has produced a year-round facility to care for the needs for the poor and the not so poor. Everyone wins!

We're about an important work that changes lives. According to the World Health Organization, there are 16 million plus people who are needlessly blind and need our help. This is a large undertaking we know. But we are sure of one thing: regardless of magnitude, we can accomplish any task on a granular level with great love.







OUR HISTORY


Since 1986, we've provided over 430,000 free surgeries to people suffering from needless blindness and other debilitating health problems. We now average about







Meet HARISHANKAR



In November he met Harishankar - a ten year old boy blind since birth. Until his surgery, Hanishanker had lived in complete darkness. Thanks to Dr. Shiva (and our donors) he can see perfectly! Harishankar now looks forward to becoming a doctor and restoring the vision of others. Unfortunately, there are still thousands of children in India who struggle without sight.





CRESP OPTICAL SHOP

Meet Michael Kizito - an optometrist in Kampala Uganda who has long dreamed of owning his own practice but lacked the start-up capital to begin. After 5 years of partnership, CharityVision was able to donate the funds necessary to build Michael an optometry practice that will follow the same social/private sustainability model as other CharityVision clinics around the world. This clinic is the first of its kind in Kampala and will serve a population of 1.2 million people. The profits of the optometry practice will fund Michael's active rural humanitarian program. We hope to screen 20,000 people each year. "This optical shop will bring bread for my family and the families of so many others, empowering my community through production and vision.



Guillermo G. HOSpital PHILIPPINES

We took advantage of an opportunity to purchase an eye hospital located in the Northern portion of the Philippines. Situated on 10 acres, this beautiful facility was established 20 years ago by Dr. Guillermo De Venecia and serves millions of people in this semi-remote area of the country. We brought in local doctors as partners and have expanded the outreach activities. Within the first month, the facility was able to cover its own expenses and the costs of the impressive amount of charity work being performed. A huge thanks to the donors who took on this large project!



Race4Sight FUNDRAISER

It is our goal to to put the fun back in fundraising! With that in mind we hosted a night at the slick-track racing go-carts and playing arcade games. 




